20 Hour Child Care Training Course



This course meets the requirements of 20 hours training to become a "Responsible Adult" as stipulated by Child Care Licensing Regulations. The content covers child development, guiding behaviour, health, safety, nutrition and programming. The course is live and interactive, so participants must have video and audio capabilities, as well as participate and attend all sessions in order to receive the certification at the end of the course.

To sign up for this course participants must:

- Be 19 years of age
- Have minimum Grade 8 English written and oral skills
- Attend all scheduled sessions

Once the training is complete, participants are eligible to work as a Responsible Adult in:

- School-age Child Care Programs
- Licensed Family Child Care
- As additional support or substitute in Licensed Preschool and Licensed Child Care Programs
- Summer Camps

YOU'RE NOT THE BOSS OF ME: UNDERSTANDING DEFIANT BEHAVIOUR AND CULTIVATING COOPERATION

You're Not the Boss of Me: Understanding Defiant Behaviour and Cultivating Cooperation - A common dynamic that is often frustrating to parents, teachers and caregivers and potentially erodes the adult/child relationship is when a child balks and defies us. It can be as subtle as ignoring our requests or as blatant as telling us "You're not the boss of me!" When we ask them to clean up, get ready for a transition, come to the table, be kind to their peers, hurry up...we may be met with a "No!" or they may in fact do the opposite. Developmental psychologist, Dr. Gordon Neufeld describes this oppositional behaviour as counterwill. Although the reaction is quite normal and even healthy in certain circumstances, its manifestations and impact can be highly disruptive, making life difficult for parents and teachers. Colleen will discuss the meaning of this deep-rooted instinct and the dynamics that control its existence and expression. She will provide strategies to help adults reduce the effects of oppositional behaviour and deepen attachment and cooperation with children.

Softening the Defenses: Helping children face vulnerability and gain resilience - For a child to develop emotionally and to mature, it is essential for a child's heart to remain soft, for emotions to be felt and expressed, and for tears of futility to be. For anyone raising or caring for a child who is very sensitive or is stuck, softening the defenses the brain has erected for protection can be a daunting task that sometimes seems almost impossible. This presentation will focus on ways we can soften a child's heart so that the tears can be restored, lowering frustration and anxiety and cultivating resilience. As a therapist and parent, Colleen will share theories and practical strategies of how to restore the ability for a child to feel, attend, grieve and attach.

Presenter: Colleen Drobot

Colleen Drobot is a registered professional counsellor with a private practice. She provides therapy for adults and also offers parent consulting using a developmental, attachment-based approach. She also works with school districts and other professionals to help make sense of children and adolescents. She is an educator with over 20 years of experience working with children in the regular classroom or in special needs settings. She is an adjunct faculty member of the Neufeld Institute.




EXPRESSIVE ART SELF CARE

Leading Self with Emotional Intelligence: Self-Leadership means knowing who you are, what you are capable of and how you can best manage emotions when working with others. Old habits die hard – understanding who you are leads to a stronger ability to create new and empowering habits. This workshop opens the doors to self-awareness by uncovering how our life events inform who we are today. It provides participants a courageous look into what might be stopping them in adopting and sustaining new behaviours, then provides strategies for overcoming those barriers.

Conflict Resolution: Workplace conflict can be defined as any situation where multiple parties have opposing needs and may range from everyday issues between people that have good relations to more serious situations involving significant interpersonal tension. Regardless of the conflict, a skilled communicator will seek to resolve it in a way that maximizes both the substantive outcome and the relationship. Fortunately, conflict resolution skills can be readily learned by most people, and the tools can be used effectively even when the other party has no specific conflict resolution skills. This program focuses intensively on skills practice, so that participants build a high level of confidence in the tools they learn before leaving the room.

Presenter: Helen Schneiderman

Helen has over 20 years' experience as an Organizational Development and Human Resources professional, working as both a consultant and within industry. Helen's expertise includes training and facilitation, people and leadership development, employee engagement, diversity and inclusion, performance management, competency development, career development, recognition and onboarding.

DOWN TO SIGN: THE BENEFITS OF USING SIGN LANGUAGE

This introductory workshop is intended for individuals who live or work with children who are developing their language. Participants will gain an understanding of communication development, how and why we communicate, and debunk common myths and facts about using sign language. Exploring Light and Shadows with Inspiration from Reggio Emilia: This workshop is very magical and offers many suggestions and ideas on how to support educator's and children's awareness of shadows, both outside in our natural environment, as well as inside our classrooms. Light and shadows are magical to children. Come and foster your own awareness of "light" and learn new strategies on how to use light tables, shadow screens, and overhead projectors in your environments and projects. The Reggio Emilia approach values using light as a material or a language to help support relationships, active investigation, and different learning styles. This workshop will offer endless opportunities to invent, imagine, wonder, explore, and problem solve with children. This workshop is a combination of a PowerPoint presentation with a hands on group activity.

Exploring Materials with Inspiration from Reggio Emilia: Materials can be viewed as a language for expression to enhance learning and understanding in children. This workshop covers different kinds of materials, where to find them, and how to incorporate them into your curriculum. The workshop also reflects on qualities of materials, transforming materials, and how to create an attractive invitation to entice children to come and explore. We also talk about creating a mini-atelier within your classroom and how to support children in beginning to design with materials. This workshop is a combination of a PowerPoint presentation and several hands on group activities.


(RE)DESIGNING YOUR CHILD CARE ENVIRONMENT


TINY STEPS, GIANT LEAPS: SHAPING DEVELOPMENT IN INFANTS & TODDLERS

An Imaginative Education approach to learning ASL and Introducing it to young children. This workshop series will introduce participants to ASL through the lenses of the theories of Imaginative Education and Unswaddling Pedagogy. Children learn through embodiment, their senses, emotions, rhythms, curiosity, wonder, metaphors, etc. Dr. Annabella Cant, an ASL learner herself, will introduce the language through "cognitive tools" that are very familiar to educators. She will engage the participants holistically, through song, movement, play, emotion, humour, and imagination. The participants will learn important facts about inclusion, about how to stay respectful toward the deaf community, and how to approach this new language in an ethical way.
