Responsible Adult

20 Hour Child Care Training Course



This course meets the requirements of 20 hours training to become a “Responsible Adult” as stipulated by Child Care Licensing Regulations. The content covers child development, guiding behaviour, health, safety, nutrition and programming. The course is live and interactive, so participants must have video and audio capabilities, as well as participate and attend all sessions in order to receive the certification at the end of the course.

To sign up for this course participants must:

- Be 19 years of age
- Have minimum Grade 8 English written and oral skills
- Attend all scheduled sessions

Once the training is complete, participants are eligible to work as a Responsible Adult in:

- School-age Child Care Programs
- Licensed Family Child Care
- As additional support or substitute in Licensed Preschool and Licensed Child Care Programs
- Summer Camps

TINY STEPS, GIANT LEAPS: SHAPING DEVELOPMENT IN INFANTS & TODDLERS

By blending academic theories with real-world applications, participants will have an opportunity to explore the tools to foster an optimal environment for early childhood development.

Presenter: Minnie Mossop

Dr. Minnie Mossop is a specialist in infant and toddler care, deeply committed to early childhood education. She holds a Ph.D. and MA in Infant and Early Childhood Development, and an M.Ed. in Early Childhood Education. Her research covers attachment, brain development, and co-regulation, applied to group childcare settings. Currently, she is a faculty member at Douglas College, offering expert guidance to families and educators across North America through consultations and workshops.

BEING WITH AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE (ASL) (3 DAY COURSE)

Coquitlam CCRR • 1130C Austin Avenue • Fee: \$50.00 • Suitable for child care providers, child care workforce, and parents.

An Imaginative Education approach to learning ASL and Introducing it to young children. This workshop series will introduce participants to ASL through the lenses of the theories of Imaginative Education and Unswaddling Pedagogy. Children learn through embodiment, their senses, emotions, rhythms, curiosity, wonder, metaphors, etc. Dr. Annabella Cant, an ASL learner herself, will introduce the language through “cognitive tools” that are very familiar to educators. She will engage the participants holistically, through song, movement, play, emotion, humour, and imagination. The participants will learn important facts about inclusion, about how to stay respectful toward the deaf community, and how to approach this new language in an ethical way.


The workshop series will also approach all the principles of the BC Early Learning Framework. So, let us enter together this wonderful world of ASL!

- Session 1: introduction, theory, history of ASL, communication to parents about learning ASL, alphabet, and numbers.
- Session 2: frequently used words with young children, sentence and question formation.
- Session 3: ASL through songs, stories, transitions, and games.

Presenter: Dr. Annabella Cant

Dr. Annabella Cant is a professor in Early Childhood Education at Capilano University. In 2022 Annabella was nominated for the BCTLC West Coast Teaching Excellence award. She has previously received the 2019 Teaching Excellence Award from Capilano University. Annabella has been practicing ECCE since 1994; in 1999 she started opening her own childcare centres in Europe (her schools were dedicated to children with very diverse backgrounds and abilities).

BULLY PREVENTION: THEIR MAKING, UNMAKING & PROTECTION

Bullies: Their Making and Unmaking

The bully is an enigma. Because of this, we mistakenly think a child who is bullying is strong, where they are very insecure and fragile. We attribute intention and choice of the bully, when really what drives the behaviour is a deep-rooted instinct and a hardened heart. Because of common misperceptions and misunderstanding of the root causes, we proceed to battle against the symptoms, exacerbating the very syndrome we wish to confront. We cannot effectively address a problem we do not understand. Colleen will trace the bully syndrome to its roots and pave the way for change that is deep and lasting. She will offer stories and examples to bring theory to life.

Protecting Children Against Bullying

As educators and parents, we want to protect children from the wounding, harm and even trauma that happens when a child is bullied. Parents, educators, and caregivers often wonder: is there a way we can prevent children from being bullied? Are there skills that can be taught so that kids in our care can learn how to deal effectively with a child who is bullying? And if one of the children has been mistreated, what can we say and do to lessen the hurt and foster resilience? In this presentation, Colleen will address these questions and will discuss three key factors that are imperative for educators and parents to understand if they hope to protect children. Through theory, stories, and examples she will address how educators and parents can best equip their children against bullying and cultivate resilience in the face of it.

Colleen Drobot is a registered professional counsellor with a private practice. She provides therapy for adults and also offers parent consulting using a developmental, attachment-based approach. She also works with school districts and other professionals to help make sense of children and adolescents. She is an educator with over 20 years of experience working with children in the regular classroom or in special needs settings. She is an adjunct faculty member of the Neufeld Institute.
