RESPONSIBLE ADULT: 20 HOUR CHILD CARE TRAINING COURSE

Monday, May 26th - Friday, June 6th (weekdays), 2025 • 10:00AM-12:00PM • Online • Fee: \$20.00 • Suitable for child care providers and child care workforce.

This course fulfills the 20-hour training requirement to become a "Responsible Adult" as stipulated by Child Care Licensing Regulations. The content covers topics such as child development, behaviour, health, safety, nutrition, and programming. The course is live and interactive, so participants must have both video and audio capabilities.

Participants are required to: be at least 19 years old at the time of registration, demonstrate Grade 8 proficiency in both written and spoken English (or an equivalent level) to engage actively in class, and attend all sessions to earn a certificate of completion.

Upon successfully completing this course, participants will be qualified to work as a Responsible Adult in various environments, including School-age Child Care Programs, Licensed Family Child Care, as additional support or substitutes in Licensed Preschool and Child Care Programs, as well as Summer Camps.

FAMILY CHILD CARE ADMINISTRATION: 16 HOUR COURSE

April 8th, 15th, 22nd & 29th (Tuesdays), 2025 • 9:30AM-12:30PM • Online • Fee: \$20.00 • Suitable for child care providers and child care workforce.

This 16-hour course utilizes interactive sessions to guide participants through best practices in family child care, alongside fundamental business practices such as projecting a family child care budget, maintaining records, organizing expenses, and preparing for tax season. We will identify and review the necessary policies and procedures in family child care. As a final project, participants will either create or update their own Parent Package, which includes their center's policies, contracts, daily schedule, programming, and more. Participants are required to have a basic understanding of word processing to complete the Parent Package document.

Objectives:

- Familiarize yourself with CCRR best practices in family child care.
- Identify and review policies and procedures, and create or update a Parent Package that must be approved before the final session.
- Explore basic business practices.
- Gain basic knowledge about the Affordable Child Care Benefit.
- Learn effective strategies for building positive relationships with families.

This course is designed for registered or licensed family child care providers who wish to enhance their administrative skills or review their Parent Package. It is intended for participants who have completed the Responsible Adult course and want to advance their careers in child care by starting their own family child care business. Please note that this 16-hour course (which includes both class time and independent learning) does not qualify participants to become a licensed family child care provider or to open a family child care business. For further information, please contact your local Child Care Resource and Referral Office (CCRR) or Licensing Office.

Participants are additionally required to: be at least 19 years old at the time of registration, demonstrate Grade 8 proficiency in both written and spoken English (or an equivalent level) to engage actively in class, and attend all sessions to earn a certificate of completion.


SUPPORTING CHILDREN'S OUTDOOR RISKY PLAY

Research is clear on the importance of regular and repeated access to outdoor risky play. Early learning and child care centres are important environments for the early years, and experiences in these settings provide essential opportunities for children's outdoor risky play that they may not have at home. Learn the key concepts that support outdoor risky play and how you can begin to incorporate these into your programs and plans. This interactive workshop will work through real examples from early learning and child care environments, focusing on how to support children's outdoor risky play. Recent research from British Columbia will showcase how child care centres are supporting outdoor risky play through policy, practice and environment modifications.



HARMONY IN TUNE: BUILDING EMOTIONAL LITERACY AND SELF-REGULATION

This workshop offers a dynamic exploration of the vital roles of co-regulation and affect attunement in children's development. As participants in this workshop, educators will gain deep insights into how co-regulation lays the groundwork for children to master self-regulation, a cornerstone of their holistic growth. We'll illuminate the concept of affect attunement—the empathic syncing of emotions with a child—which forms the foundation of coregulation, emotional literacy, and is pivotal in relationship-based education.

Presenter: Minnie Mossop

Dr. Minnie Mossop is a specialist in infant and toddler care, deeply committed to early childhood education. She holds a Ph.D. and MA in Infant and Early Childhood Development, and an M.Ed. in Early Childhood Education. Her research covers attachment, brain development, and co-regulation, applied to group childcare settings. Currently, she is a faculty member at Douglas College, offering expert quidance to families and educators across North America through consultations and workshops.



MANAGING BIG FEELINGS: AN INTRODUCTION TO EMOTION REGULATION

What is emotion regulation? And how do we support the growth of these skills in childcare settings, schools and at home? In a nutshell, we will practice ways to support children in managing their big feelings, as well as address how to manage our own big reactions in the process.

She works with adults, children and parents struggling with anxiety, the impact of historical or recent trauma, and problems in interpersonal relationships. She is a certified Trauma Informed Stabilization Treatment Therapist (TIST) and is trained in Sensorimotor Psychotherapy, Emotion-Focused Therapy for Couples (EFT) and Families (EFFT), Gottman Couple's Therapy, Expressive Play Therapy and Narrative Therapy.

PREVENTING SENSORY OVERLOAD & OVERSTIMULATION IN YOUR CENTRE

Have you experienced children with challenging behaviours? What does the environment say when this occurs? Providing children with a safe and inclusive environment can eliminate negative behaviours and allow children to feel a sense of belonging. Providing children with age and developmentally appropriate child care environments allows children to flourish and thrive. Through this workshop, we will discuss what sensory overstimulation looks like within the child care and how the impacts it has on both children and Educators. We will focus on key concepts that participants can apply to their daily practice in the centre.

Presenter: Prab Gill

Prab Gill is an Early Childhood Educator with over 15 years of experience in the field. She has Instructed ECE courses for local colleges. Prab has hands-on experience providing care to children through her respective roles as an Educator and Manager of Licensed childcare facilities in the lower mainland. Prab is passionate about building rapport within the community and sharing her knowledge around child development. Prab recognizes the importance of self care and often recharges by spending time in nature.



K-Transition: Supporting Children During Kindergarten Transition

USING CHILDREN'S LITERATURE TO NURTURE SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL DEVELOPMENT

FUNCTIONS OF BEHAVIOURS: REDUCING THE UNEXPECTED

WEAVING TOGETHER THE HEALTH AND WELLBEING OF CHILDREN WITH THE HEALTH AND WELLBEING OF THE LAND

Cree Elder, Mr. Joseph Masty* asked: 'If the land is not healthy, then how can we be?' Medical Health Officer with Vancouver Island Health and a member of Stz'uminus First Nation, Dr. Shannon Waters says: 'We are the land, and the land is us.' Indigenous worldviews include ethics of respect, reciprocity, and responsibility to the land and other beings inhabiting the land.

Inspired by these worldviews, in this session, you will be invited to engage with critical questions such as, How do early childhood educators create a culture of health and wellbeing that includes the land (as well as air, water) and other beings through our pedagogical practice? Can we generate kinship ties and fellowship with all our relations? With the creation of respectful, reciprocal relationships with the land will children grow & learn in a healthier way? These questions are aimed to open up a conversation where health and wellbeing become complex dynamic processes closely related to cultural values and the kind of choices we make in our daily practice.



When Maria Reed was a child she had a reoccurring dream that she was being chased on horseback by "wild Indians." Back then, she didn't know she was Indigenous, but now that she knows, the dream makes sense symbolically. Like so many Indigenous people, her parents and grandparents were robbed of their heritage in residential schools and were fearful of discrimination, so they didn't practice their culture. Like the dream she had as a child however, Maria's Indigeous background would eventually catch up to her in her teens when one of her aunts discovered the family's Indigenous roots. Maria hasn't looked back since, immersing herself in the culture. Her great grandmother was from the Batchewana First Nation in Ontario and her great grandfather was French and Métis. Maria is French, Cree and Ojibeway on her father's side and Swedish Sami on her mother's side. The Sami are Sweden's Indigenous people and known as Reindeer Herders. Since finding out about her Indigenous roots in her teens, Maria has immersed herself in learning about her culture. "When I found out it was one of those ah ah moments," says Maria. Her Indigenous name, Waabigekek Ikwe, means White Hawk Woman. Maria loves being an Elder and feels that everything she has done in the fields of wellness - body, mind and spirit, has come together to prepare her to be an Elder.
